19 Next up, we've got a presentation of a

20 Certificate of Recognition. Where is Brian?

21 Brian, you want to bring your whole team up.

6 This is about the fire that happened at

7 the courthouse.

8 MR. STAMP: Can I jump in there, Council

9 President?

10 MR. CALLAHAN: Yes, sir.

11 MR. STAMP: And then, of course, we do

12 want them to introduce themselves, but --

13 MR. CALLAHAN: Yes.

14 MR. STAMP: Thank you for inviting them in

15 this evening and offering them to recognize

16 them for their work.

17 But in December, of course, you know

18 Council, we had a fire in the north wing of the

19 courthouse. And it was just -- and I know

20 Judge Kehoe is here, Kathi is here, I think

21 Patty Campen is here as well.

1 And of course, the fire affected their  
 2 area of the courthouse. But had it not been  
 3 for the work these gentlemen that you have  
 4 before you, not only would the cost have been a  
 5 lot greater, but we would have had a very  
 6 difficult time getting back in a healthy  
 7 building.  
 8 MR. CALLAHAN: Right.  
 9 MR. STAMP: I just want to say that we  
 10 have, and I know Brian, he asked me four times  
 11 do I really have to be there because he just  
 12 likes to get the work done.  
 13 MR. CALLAHAN: Yeah.  
 14 MR. STAMP: But you know, he cut his  
 15 vacation short and came back from Florida.  
 16 And we made a phone call to Matt  
 17 Odachowski, the owner of Royal Plus, and these  
 18 gentlemen here within hours had multiple people  
 19 here, 14, 15 different people, vehicles,  
 20 tractor-trailer, equipment that they  
 21 immediately fired up. Began mold abatement and

 2 It was just an amazing sight to see. And  
 3 I just wanted to share those thoughts with you  
 4 as they introduce themselves and you all  
 5 recognize them.  
 6 So Brian, if you would, just go down the  
 7 line here, introducing yourself, please.  
 8 MR. MOORE: (Inaudible.) I'm Brian Moore,  
 9 facilities maintenance.  
 10 Cody, if you'd like to --  
 11 MR. ERB: My name is Cody. Thanks for  
 12 having us, everybody.  
 13 I'm the estimator. I'm the guy that deals  
 14 with the insurance and the trust.  
 15 MR. CALLAHAN: Yup.  
 16 MR. DUNCAN: My name is Joe Duncan.  
 17 Family is from Talbot County. I ran -- I'm the  
 18 guy in the background buying materials, getting  
 19 things squared away, bringing in forces and  
 20 everything while he does the heavy lifting.  
 21 MR. CALLAHAN: I got you. That's good.

1 MR. ORTT: My name is Jason Ortt. I was  
 2 boots on the ground. I was here pretty much  
 3 every day since December 19th at one o'clock  
 4 when I got the phone call from Matt Odachowski.  
 5 And I think we were on site at 2:05.  
 6 MR. CALLAHAN: Wow.  
 7 MR. ORTT: So it was a pleasure working  
 8 with Brian and his staff and Patty, Kathi.  
 9 They were amazing. Everybody has been amazing.  
 10 You guys have been accepting, and we were glad  
 11 we could help you out in trying times.  
 12 MR. CALLAHAN: Right. That's great.  
 13 MR. STAMP: And that middle gentleman, his  
 14 voice was a little low. He said he was a  
 15 Duncan from Oxford. So he might know one of  
 16 the Duncans that used to sit up here.  
 17 MR. CALLAHAN: I thought I heard that.  
 18 Yes, yes. That's good.  
 19 MR. STAMP: And I don't know,  
 20 Mr. President, if you want to ask the judge or  
 21 Kathi or Patty if they want to say anything or

We all got 15 this phone call or a text or I think I got a 16 message from Brian about the fire.</p> <p>17 And when we got here that day and saw the 18 water, the devastation, it was like this is 19 just -- obviously it was a disaster.</p> <p>20 But when Royal Plus came in, and they 21 just -- they were here right away and they took</p>	<p>1 operation.</p> <p>2 MR. CALLAHAN: That's great, that's great.</p> <p>3 MS. DUVALL: Very thankful.</p> <p>4 MS. CAMPEN: Well, I'll just echo what 5 everyone has been saying. But that was indeed 6 a fateful day when we came in.</p> <p>7 I think I saw you with your Welly's on. 8 And I thought oh, no, this is not good.</p> <p>9 So walking in the courthouse and the haze, 10 the smoke still hanging in the air. And I have 11 to say it looked like Hades walking in.</p> <p>12 And this is where we spend our lives. We 13 spend over eight hours a day here, five days a 14 week. And it's like a second home. And I 15 can't tell you the emotional part of it when I 16 walked in. It was devastating.</p> <p>17 And then you get into salvage mode and 18 start thinking about what you need to do. And 19 it was very traumatic. I'll say that. Trying 20 to figure out --</p> <p>21 MS. DUVALL: It was.</p>
<p>Page 11</p> <p>1 care of so much quickly and got us up and 2 running quickly.</p> <p>3 And Brian was just on top of everything.</p> <p>4 And they've been a great team to work 5 with. So we had 9 a lot going on.</p> <p>10 And these guys showed up two o'clock and 11 so started working. And I think we had been 12 shoveling water out the door trying to get it 13 out of the building --</p> <p>14 MR. STAMP: I did say to her husband, 15 Judge Campen, he had one squeegee and I had the 16 other. I said did you ever think you'd be 17 pushing water out of here in all the years you 18 worked in the courthouse.</p> <p>19 MS. CAMPEN: But I have to say, the next 20 morning when I came in, you guys had all the 21 water out, the carpet had been ripped out. It</p>

 2 transformation just overnight.

 3 So I'm just thankful for the award and I  
 4 appreciate it.

 9 I guess last week or the week before. And  
 10 people don't realize how important it is and  
 11 what a impact that you all have on, you know,  
 12 the inmates that are there.

 15 people leave, that they take some of that with  
 16 them.

 9 an acronym for Helping our Youth Achieve

 11 We're transplants from Washington, D.C.  
 12 We moved to the Eastern Shore. Me, my older  
 13 brother is in the back, and then another one of  
 14 our brothers, we based it out of Chestertown.  
 15 And it's just helping youth. We seen a  
 16 need in Chestertown. There's nothing to do.  
 17 So it's kids that was constantly getting in  
 18 trouble. We coach football, but that wasn't  
 19 enough.  
 20 So we end up doing some mentorship program  
 21 and we kind of hooked them with basketball to

1 trap them. And then that's when the community  
 2 service came in and we check on them in school.  
 3 And it's a lifetime bond. We have kids that's  
 4 in college that we still talk to on a daily  
 5 basis.  
 6 MR. DIVILIO: That is excellent.  
 7 And I remember in high school my wrestling  
 8 coach was the probation officer and the impact  
 9 that he made knowing how to work with children  
 10 that might have been on the fence of getting  
 11 into trouble and not.  
 12 You are making a difference, and I really  
 13 thank you for that.  
 14 CORPORAL TUE: Appreciate it.  
 15 MR. CALLAHAN: Thank you, Mr. Divilio.  
 16 Mr. Leshner.  
 17 MR. LESHER: Well, Mr. Tue, Corporal Tue,  
 18 it is clear that you're thanking others for the  
 19 support that you receive. But that's a sign of  
 20 leadership.  
 21 And it's very clear that you're providing
